This Strategic Plan document is a concise summary of the values, aims and ambitions we have set for ourselves as a National Sport Governing Body to drive Badminton forward for all levels and all ages in Ghana.

The Ghana Badminton Association (GBA) aims to develop and promote badminton at all levels with focus on grassroots, competitive, and elite, by implementing a structured, long-term strategy. This plan focuses on the 4Ps: Participation, People, Places, and Performance to ensure sustainable growth.

Participation:

We will increase participation among adults, disabled people, in schools, and our own membership.

Places

We will grow the participation network of schools, community clubs and facilities within a Badminton Competitive league and at a social level;

People:

We will increase the number of qualified officials and coaches: provide support for Badminton 'activators', and grow the number of volunteers and officials and provide additional training and support.

Performances:

We want our elite athletes performing at a world class level and will provide the Support and competitive structure at the domestic level for all our players to achieve their potential. Our targets are bold and ambitious.

They are also clearly set out and they are attainable over the next few years.

STRATEGIC PILLARS

We based our strategy on our four pillars that are underpin the entire purpose of Ghana badminton.

Pillar 1:

Participation

(Grassroots & Mass Engagement)

OUR STRATEGIC GOAL STRATEGY

To encourage more people to play more frequently. Everyone can participate in badminton, and we want to make sure that there are plenty of inclusive pathways and opportunities available to make badminton as accessible as it has ever been.

We aim to achieve an increase in regular adult participation to over 4,200,000 Individuals by 2032 by making the sport accessible to everyone, where and when they want to play.

Specifically, working with partners, we want to increase the number of disabled people regularly taking part to 6,600 by 2032.

BADMINTON IN SCHOOLS & YOUNG PEOPLE PROJECT

The key to long-term growth is getting schools to embrace badminton.

- Community Venues: We will work to get
 Badminton offered for young people in 314
 additional community venues and played in 94%
 more schools -basic, secondary, tertiary (teacher
 training, TVET, universities, etc).
- Clubs and Associations: The new school-club link programme will provide a sustainable partnership with all schools.
- Smooth Transitions: Make it easier to transition from school involvement to badminton competition
- **Sport Introduction:** Introduce badminton in 500+ basic and senior high schools
- Partnerships: Partner with the Ministry of Education to integrate badminton into physical education curricula.
- **Leagues:** Annual Inter-School Badminton League from March 2027





MEMBERSHIP

- We would like 90% of regular Ghana Badminton participants to be members of Ghana Badminton Association (GBA) to enjoy a lifestyle of abroad and business participation. We need to ensure that membership is adding value to enjoyment of the game. By carrying out regular customer satisfaction surveys year on year, we will know if we are listening to you. We will fully automate membership
- Establish community and mobile badminton hubs in all 16 regions.
- Organize corporate badminton leagues to engage working professionals.

INCLUSION AND DIVERSITY

- Promoting and empowering female players at all levels of African badminton.
- Collaborating with organizations that oversee inclusion and diversity to create additional avenues and chances to guarantee that badminton is available to everyone.
- Urge GBA members to incorporate para badminton into national governance and management frameworks.
- By encouraging badminton as a sport of participation, (you may empower)
 people of all ages and backgrounds will be empowered to lead mentally
 and physically stimulating lives and contribute to a healthier society.
- Encourage badminton as a universally accessible and safe sport;
- Raise awareness of Para badminton among seniors; support Special Olympics and badminton for individuals with intellectual disabilities; and expand participation in the sport worldwide.
- Badminton for All campaign to promote inclusivity.

Pillar 2: Clubs & Leagues

- By 2032, there should be a club and/or league within 30 minutes' drive and of 80% of the Badminton population.
- Establish a National Premier League, schools, college, and Veterans League.
- We will grow the network of clubs and leagues so that best practice and sharing of ideas can take place.
- Working with grant-making bodies such as NGO's and partners, as we will re-launch a facilities strategy to assist club and league development.

SOCIAL & RECREATIONAL

 Ghana Badminton is flexible and accessible and has always been played in a wide variety of

- locations since 1962. We will increase the number of vibrant, social, and recreational venues offering Badminton by 20% each year.
- Badminton at your fingertips: programs and easily accessible web platforms that enable more individuals to discover local opportunities for play.
- Building on the successful badminton in Schools Project of the last five years, we will focus on a long-term school placement programme.
- We will introduce a funded strategy to create and support more places to play so that everyone can have fun, especially with air badminton
- Community & Corporate Engagement



Pillar 3:

Coaches

We believe that coaching is fundamental to players of all levels who are looking to improve. The player-coach relationship is a very special one that must be nurtured and supported.

We will launch a campaign to highlight coaching as a career opportunity, using our defined pathways.

Not everyone wants to be a qualified coach, so we will provide additional support for more badminton 'activators.

We know that a lack of coaches holds back growth and development of the sport. Therefore, we will double the number of active, licensed coaches to more than 640 of sufficient quality to support the growth and ambition of players.

Implement -"No License, no coaching" policy from January 2026.

Pillar 4:

Performance

(Elite & Competitive Badminton)

PERFORMANCE

- Very few players will become part of the elite system, but those who do, become important role models. By 2027, we want to be achieving. Medals consistently on a world stage at senior, junior and sub-junior levels.
- We will aim to have seniors, juniors, and Sub-Juniors in the world's top 50 and remain in the top 3 African countries consistently.
- By 2032, we will top the Commonwealth Games Badminton medal table in Africa
- By 2028, we want to qualify 2 athletes to the LA Olympics and be at the podium by year 2032.
- At the base of the pyramid, we will have a national network of two Talent Development Centres supported by High Performance coaches.

COMPETITION

- It is very important that every player who wants to play competitive badminton has access to competitions at the right level for them to perform and achieve their goals.
- To support the performance pathway, a domestic badminton competition structure must support elite player development.
- We will re-establish Ghana as a host of a major international event after hosting the 2023 African Games with our 2032 Sustainability and Legacy Plan.
- Our domestic competition structure will replicate international standards.
- Our competition structure will provide the right level of opportunities for all players in sponsorship, and or endorsement, live streaming, and an engaging website from January 2025











STAFF AND CORPORATE OFFICE

We must have part time, paid staff of five and office volunteers with a corporate office. Our staff is important to us. We will maintain an enthusiastic and expert staff workforce through providing a rewarding environment in which to work and provide professional development opportunities.

Our ad hoc Staff will work hand in glove with the volunteer workforce to support each other.

MONITORING & EVALUATION (M&E)

To ensure the successful implementation of the GBA 2032 Strategic Plan, a robust Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) framework is essential. This plan will track progress, measure impact, and ensure accountability across all four strategic pillars: Participation, Places, People, and Performance.

B. Data Collection Methods

- Surveys & Feedback: Annual participation surveys, school/club feedback forms.
- Digital Tracking: Automated membership system, event registrations.
- Partnership Reports: Ministry of Education, National Sports Authority.
- Competition Records: BWF, African Badminton Federation, Olympic Committee.





ACCOUNTABILITY & GOVERNANCE

- M&E Committee: Composed of GBA board members, external experts.
- Transparency: Public dashboards on GBA website.
- Corrective Actions: If KPIs lag, adjust programs, funding, or partnerships.

TOOLS & TECHNOLOGY

- Digital Dashboard: Real-time tracking of KPIs (e.g., Power BI, Google Data Studio).
- Automated Membership System: Tracks player growth, coach certifications.
- Social Media Analytics: Measures engagement & awareness campaigns.
